From The Pastor...

Those of you who attended the event on healthy church leadership in February may remember the example that Professor Nessan used to open his presentation. He talked about putting food into the refrigerator. If we have leftovers, we put them in a Tupperware container, or at least cover them in foil or plastic wrap. There are drawers for vegetables and drawers for cheese. And if



we have milk, we definitely make sure that it's in some kind of container before we put it away! If we just poured milk into the fridge, it wouldn't be much good when we came back to look for it later. The containers we use to keep our food safe and usable are analogous to the boundaries that are necessary to the function of a healthy church.

Boundaries are good. They allow us to know what work is ours to do, and what belongs to someone else. Healthy boundaries can help keep us from burnout, while also helping to create a sustainable culture for our congregation.

When my colleagues have asked me in recent weeks what work we have done together, I've realized that it can be summed up as establishing and defining healthy boundaries for the sake of the long-term health of our congregation. We updated our constitution, including the size of our Council, to make sense for the size of our congregation. We've created job descriptions for all staff, so that they don't end up in the position of being asked to do more than what they are paid to do. We've created and updated policies to acknowledge that we now share our building with M&M, and also to acknowledge the level of trust that people deserve to have in the leaders of a church.

Together, we have worked on discerning what we want future pastoral leadership to look like. I've been in touch with Rachel Bauman at the WI Conference, as well as other faith leaders in the area, to consider how we can find pastoral leadership for Plymouth quickly while also making a good match.

My goal in all of these tasks has been to create a culture at Plymouth that will be able to sustain itself for the coming years. I hope that the next pastor will be able to start with a solid foundation, not having to patch things up before getting

Al-Nakba: The Palestinian Catastrophe Video will be shown in the Cozy Room at 11:30 on November 9th. Al-Nakba, or "the catastrophe," refers to the mass displacement and dispossession of over 750,000 Palestinians during the 1948 Arab-Israeli war, following the creation of the State of Israel. This foundational trauma continues to shape Palestinian identity and struggle, as families commemorate the loss of their homeland and advocate for justice and the right of return. We are offering this video and discussion in response to the invitation from the Wisconsin Conference to learn more about the conflict in Israel-Palestine, consistent with a resolution passed by the UCC General Assembly in 2021. A copy of that resolution is available in the church office.
